Homework policy

Rationale: We believe that homework supports, extends and consolidates the learning covered in the classroom while supporting children to develop self- discipline, independence and the ability to take responsibility for their own learning.

This policy aims to:

- Raise achievement;
- Ensure a consistency of approach throughout the school;
- Ensure teachers, parents and carers have a clear understanding about expectations of themselves and pupils.

The main purpose of homework is:

- to consolidate and reinforce the skills and understanding developed at school in the key areas of reading, writing and language development.
- to develop a love of reading and to become a confident, independent reader by the end of KS1.

Principles.

- The amount and difficulty of homework is tailored according to the child's age and ability.
- Sufficient time is allowed for the completion of homework to allow for a healthy home/school work balance.
- Teacher's incorporate homework into their weekly planning and ensure that the tasks are differentiated, purposeful and aimed at developing and consolidating basic skills.
- Teachers provide parents and pupils with support when required through clear instructions, guidance and in providing suitable resources.

Homework Guidelines.

We believe that the most important homework activity is regular reading. Suggested reading times are 10 minutes every day. This could be 5 minutes listening to your child read and 5 minutes reading a story to your child.

There is an expectation that reading at home will happen daily (5 times a week minimum). It is important for parents / carers to read with children and to discuss books, pictures and stories, even when they are in Year 2. Children's reading diaries are to be signed and dated by parents / carers daily, after hearing children read.

How you can help your child with their homework

Below is a list of ways that you as a parent can show your child that you value their homework and the time and effort spent completing it. As a school we hope that you will find this guidance helpful in

supporting your child fully with their homework.

You can show you value your child's homework by: providing a suitable place in which your child can do their homework, preferably with an adult to discuss, encourage and support;

- making it clear to your child that you value homework and support the school in explaining how it can help learning;
- listening to your child read their reading book every day for a short time;
- sign and date reading diary to let us know when you have read with your child;
- read regularly to your child. This could be by reading a <u>daily bedtime story</u>;
- encouraging your child and praising them when they have completed their homework;
- Helping your child to value books by helping them to care for their reading books and returning them to school on time;
- Help your child to spend a short time each day on homework.

Additionally, you can support your child's development by:

- cooking with them;
- visits to libraries/museums etc;
- taking your child swimming;
- playing games, e.g. board games, cards, ball games;
- watching informative TV programmes together;
- providing opportunities for craft activities, e.g. cutting, sticking, sewing, painting etc.;
- gardening and growing plants;
- using the internet to research something with your child (following guidelines for safe internet use);
- Attending any school workshops that may be on offer designed to enable Parents/Carers to support their child's learning at home;
- Talking to your child about schoolwork, their day, what they have been learning about and how they have been learning.

Remember: Homework is about reinforcing, practising and confidence building... Enthusing your child about undertaking homework and modelling the high value of homework to them is of key importance. Make it fun!
